And as usual, one of the major costs paid by your rates is for growth and providing core services to the new greenfield housing areas outside of the current city boundaries. The investment back into the existing city is very small. No wonder the downtown is dying. And this has been going on for years.

If the ratepayer subsidy to new greenfield housing areas was eg \$20 million dollars per year, over the last 15 years, there would have been \$300 million dollars available to spend on the quality of life in Tauranga, perhaps build a stadium, museum, new parks.

But this money has been wasted on the urge to grow Tauranga as fast as possible.

Message to Council -- look after your existing ratepayers first - for example -- remedy the traffic bottlenecks (Turret Rd bridge) before spending on new housing areas. Improve the lifestyle of the existing ratepayers.

Tauranga City Council continues to press ahead with imposing a monopolistic council controlled kerbside pickup of rubbish and recycling without informing the ratepayers of Tauranga the additional cost to be added to your rates.

As far is the council is concerned, ratepayers will not know the costs and do not need to know the costs before the council vote is taken.



Major government change in Recycling announced July 2020:

"The new government policy, which was announced by Associate Environment Minister Eugenie Sage, aims to shift the burden of waste management from communities and councils back onto those who manufacture the products.

What does this mean. The new council proposed recycling pickup scheme will be redundant before it even starts. Does Tauranga need this recycling scheme?

Lets work out what this GOVT scheme will mean for Tauranga.

Do you know the extra charge on your rates? Would you like to know before the councillors votes on this?

We would expect this information to be made available to each ratepayer and then an informed consultation can take place.

This is not a democratic process.



If you agree, email your councillors today and tell them.

- To defer the decision for another 5 years while the new legislation is developed and bedded in. There is no need to rush the decision.
- Make public the true cost of the proposed kerbside collection before a vote is made.
- Democratically include the ratepayers in this process.
- More consultation with the ratepayers about costs and benefits.
- Make public the business case for council control.
- Once the contract is signed, the ratepayers are committed to a contract for 10 years with annual value increases.

Talking to BOPRC re the non compliance with the clauses of the Resource Consent 63636.

TCC appears adamant they will keep planting in Palm Beach Reserve. We have been told it will cost \$250,000 to change the resource consent. Seems unbelieveable but it is cheaper than the \$1.3 million the TCC has allocated in the Annual Plan to plant in Palm Beach Reserve this year.

18 months later .. Still no reparations.

What is the TCC policy on like for like reseals?

Beware

If you see markings on the your residential road then the road could be part of the resealing program and there is no guarantee that the reseal will be in the same finish ie hotmix.

Why not – push back against the council – you do want chipseal on a hot mix road. See the disaster of Oriental Parade.



\$45 million for Tauranga's Cameron Rd upgrade.

From 17th Avenue to CBD -- free from Covid 19 fund so urgency.

Significant project components include:

- Peak commute period bus clearways and intersection improvements to enhance public transport reliability.
- High-quality bus stops, bus shelters and messaging infrastructure.
- Separated cycleway and "micro-mobility spine" between Tauranga Hospital and the city centre.
- Side-street improvements and placemaking initiatives.
- Intersection and safety improvements, including new traffic signals.
- Pedestrian crossing improvements.
- Central median and kerb adjustments to support the new road layout.
- Pavement renewals.
- Stormwater improvements.

"The whole idea of urban intensification is that people don't have to use cars. Whether they walk, bike or use public transport, those are the three modes of transport that are going to be addressed and everyone can benefit from that."

"But in the years to come, we will see the value of doing this, so long as they make sure it works for people who are currently using it."

Any benefits for car drivers, future autonomous vehicles or shopkeepers??? – the economic drivers for the area. Looks like another "Greerton anti- car bottleneck" coming soon. This is a major arterial route into Tauranga.


